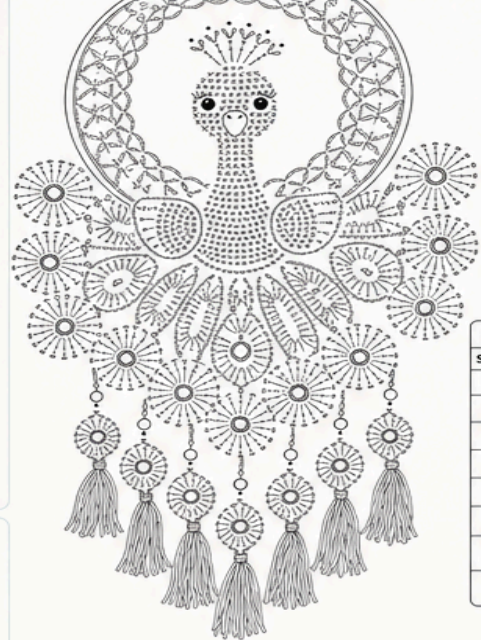
FINISHED SIZE

Approx. 30 cm (12 in) wide
x 45 cm (18 in) long
(including tassels)

MATERIALS

- Worsted weight yarn (acrylic) in multiple colors
- Crochet hook: 4.0 mm (G/6)
- 12 mm safety eyes
- Polyester fiberfill stuffing
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Embroidery hoop: 25 cm (10 in)
- Pearl beads (12 mm)
- Gold jump rings (optional)
- Hot glue (optional)

ABOUT THE PATTERN

This design features a peacock inside a lace hoop with colorful feather motifs and tassels. It is made using basic stitches and simple shapes. Follow the steps carefully and enjoy your handmade wall hanging!

- ch = chain
- sl st = slip stitch
- sc = single crochet
- hdc = half double crochet
- dc = double crochet

STEP-BY-STEP TUTORIAL

1. PEACOCK BODY (Make 1)

With main color (mint).
R1: 6 sc in magic ring. [6]
R2: (inc) x 6. [12]
R3: (sc, inc) x 6. [18]
R4: (2 sc, inc) x 6. [24]
R5: (3 sc, inc) x 6. [30]
R6-12: sc around. [30]
R13: (3 sc, dec) x 6. [24]
R14: (2 sc, dec) x 6. [18]
R15: (sc, dec) x 6. [12]
R16: dec x 6. [6]
Fasten off. Stuff firmly.



2. PEACOCK HEAD (Make 1)

With main color.
R1: 6 sc in magic ring. [6]
R2: (inc) x 6. [12]
R3: (sc, inc) x 6. [18]
R4: (2 sc, inc) x 6. [24]
R5-7: sc around. [24]
Insert safety eyes between R4-R5, 6 sts apart. Add beak with light peach yarn. Stuff and sew to the top of the body.



3. CREST (Make 1)

With light purple.
Ch 8.
Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, (dc, tr, dc, sl st, picot, sl st, dc, tr, dc) in same ch. Repeat across. Fasten off and sew to the top of the head.



4. WINGS (Make 2)

With mint.
Ch 6.
Row 1: (sc, hdc, dc, hdc, sc, sl st) in 2nd ch from hook. Fasten off leaving a long tail for sewing.



5. ASSEMBLY (BODY)

Sew wings to each side of the body.



FEATHER MOTIF (Make 15)

Make in different colors (see photo). Each feather has a pearl in the center.
Ch 6.
Row 1: (dc, tr, dc, hdc, sc, sl st) in 2nd ch from hook.
Row 2: Ch 3, turn. (sc, hdc, dc, hdc, sc) around the previous row, working into the sides. Fasten off. Sew or glue a 12 mm pearl bead in the center.



MAKE THE HOOP BACKGROUND

Attach white yarn to the hoop.
Work the stitch pattern from the chart around the entire hoop.
This creates the lacy background.



ASSEMBLE THE PEACOCK

- Center the peacock in the hoop and sew it in place.
- Arrange the feather motifs around the bottom half as shown.
- Sew or glue each feather securely.



ADD HANGING STRANDS

- For each strand:
1. Attach a feather.
 2. Add a pearl bead (12 mm).
 3. Add another feather (optional).
 4. Finish with a tassel.

Attach the strands evenly across the bottom of the hoop.

TASSELS: Wrap yarn around a book (approx. 60-70 times). Tie the top, cut the bottom, and secure on the strand.



BASIC STITCH GUIDE (US TERMS)

CHAIN (ch)

Yarn over, pull through loop on hook.



SLIP STITCH (sl st)

Insert hook, pull yarn through both loops.



SINGLE CROCHET (sc)

Insert hook, yarn over, pull through, yarn over, pull through both loops.



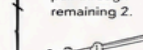
HALF DOUBLE CROCHET (hdc)

Yarn over, insert hook, yarn over, pull through, yarn over, pull through all 3 loops.



DOUBLE CROCHET (dc)

Yarn over, insert hook, yarn over, pull through, yarn over, pull through 2 loops, yarn over, pull through remaining 2.



TREBLE CROCHET (tr)

Yarn over, twice, insert hook, yarn over, pull through, yarn over, pull through 2 loops, yarn over, pull through 2 loops, yarn over, pull through remaining 2.



TIPS & NOTES

- Use stitch markers to keep track of your rounds.
- Stuff the head and body firmly for a nice shape.
- Block your motifs lightly if needed.
- You can customize colors to match your style.
- This pattern is beginner-friendly with a beautiful result!

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Crochet Peacock Dreamcatcher Wall Hanging Tutorial

This tutorial is a complete US-terms version based on the provided crochet chart and step-by-step reference. It includes the crocheted peacock, lace hoop background, 15 feather motifs, hanging strands, tassels, and final assembly.

The finished wall hanging is approximately **12 in (30 cm) wide × 18 in (45 cm) long**, including the tassels.

Materials

You will need:

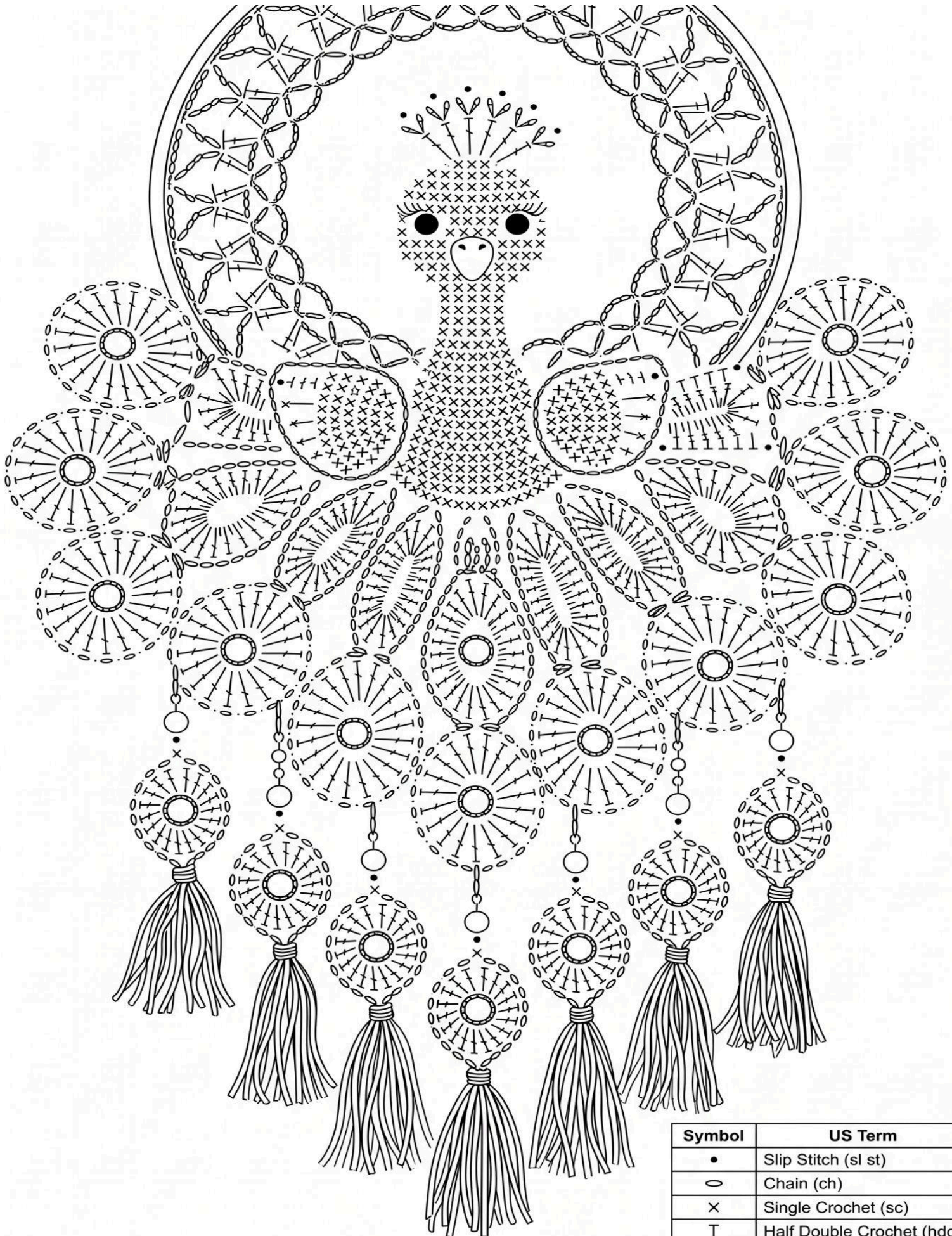
- **Worsted-weight acrylic yarn** in several colors
 - Mint/light green for the peacock body
 - Light purple for the crest
 - Mint for the wings
 - Assorted colors for the feather motifs
 - White for the lace hoop background
 - Optional coordinating colors for the hanging strands and tassels
- **4.0 mm (G/6) crochet hook**
- **12 mm safety eyes**
- **Polyester fiberfill**
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- **10-inch (25 cm) embroidery hoop**
- **12 mm pearl beads**
- Optional **gold jump rings**
- Optional hot glue
- Measuring tape
- Stitch markers, optional

Yarn choice

The reference uses worsted-weight acrylic yarn. For the closest appearance, use yarn of approximately **medium/#4 weight**.

You can reproduce the pastel color scheme from the example or choose your own colors. The feather motifs are especially suitable for using several colors.

Important stitch symbols from the chart

The chart uses these symbols:

- ● = slip stitch
- ○ = chain
- × = single crochet
- T = half double crochet
- **Double vertical symbol** = double crochet
- **Tall double vertical symbol** = treble crochet
- **Cluster/puff symbol** = cluster or puff stitch
- **Oval/teardrop symbol** = picot

For the written portions below, follow the US terminology listed above.

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Before You Start

The project is easiest to make in this order:

1. Crochet the peacock body.
2. Crochet the head.
3. Make and attach the crest.
4. Make both wings.
5. Make the 15 feather motifs.
6. Crochet the lace background around the hoop.
7. Assemble the peacock onto the hoop.
8. Arrange and attach the feather motifs.
9. Make the hanging strands.
10. Add the tassels.
11. Make final adjustments and secure everything.

Keep your yarn tails long enough for sewing wherever possible.

Step 1: Crochet the Peacock Body

Use your **main peacock color**, such as mint green.

The body is worked in continuous rounds.

If you are working in continuous rounds, place a stitch marker in the first stitch of each round so you don't lose your place.

Round 1

Make a magic ring.

Work **6 sc** into the magic ring.

6 sts

Round 2

Work **inc in each stitch around**.

12 sts

Written:

(inc) × 6

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Round 3

Work:

(sc, inc) × 6

18 sts

Round 4

Work:

(2 sc, inc) × 6

24 sts

Round 5

Work:

(3 sc, inc) × 6

30 sts

Rounds 6–12

Work **sc around** for each round.

You should have:

30 sts in each round

Continue working evenly until you complete Round 12.

At this point the body should have a long, rounded, slightly tapered shape.

Round 13

Work:

(3 sc, dec) × 6

24 sts

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Round 14

Work:

(2 sc, dec) × 6

18 sts

Round 15

Work:

(sc, dec) × 6

12 sts

Round 16

Work:

dec × 6

6 sts

Fasten off.

Stuff the body

Before completely closing the body, fill it firmly with polyester fiberfill.

Add small amounts of stuffing at a time and distribute it evenly.

The reference specifically calls for the body to be **stuffed firmly**. The finished body should hold its shape without becoming extremely hard.

Weave the yarn tail through the remaining stitches and pull to close the opening.

Secure the yarn and weave in the remaining end.

Step 2: Crochet the Peacock Head

Use the **same main color** as the body.

The head is also worked in rounds.

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Round 1

Make a magic ring.

Work **6 sc** into the ring.

6 sts

Round 2

Work:

inc × 6

12 sts

Round 3

Work:

(sc, inc) × 6

18 sts

Round 4

Work:

(2 sc, inc) × 6

24 sts

Rounds 5–7

Work:

sc around

Keep **24 sts** in each round.

Do not fasten off immediately because the head needs to be prepared for the eyes and beak and then attached to the body.

Add the Safety Eyes

Insert the **12 mm safety eyes** between Rounds 4 and 5.

The reference places the eyes approximately **6 stitches apart**.

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Before locking the backs into position, check the placement from the front.

Make sure:

- Both eyes are at the same height.
- They are centered on the face.
- The distance between them looks even.
- The head is facing straight forward.

Once you are satisfied with the placement, secure the safety eyes.

Add the Beak

Use **light peach yarn** for the beak.

The reference shows a small rounded/pointed beak centered between and slightly below the eyes.

Sew the beak securely to the face.

Keep the beak relatively small so that the eyes remain the dominant facial feature.

Stuff the Head

Add polyester fiberfill to the head.

Stuff it firmly enough to create a rounded head, but do not overstuff it to the point where the stitches become stretched.

Shape the head with your fingers as you add the stuffing.

Close the opening securely and leave an appropriate yarn tail for sewing.

Sew the Head to the Body

Position the head directly on top of the body.

Use the yarn needle and the remaining yarn tail to sew the head securely to the top of the body.

Stitch around the joining area several times.

The head should sit firmly and upright.

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Step 3: Make the Peacock Crest

Use **light purple yarn**.

The crest consists of several small decorative points worked from a chain.

Foundation

Ch 8.

Row 1

Starting in the **2nd chain from the hook**, work the following sequence into the same chain as instructed in the chart:

(dc, tr, dc, sl st, picot, sl st, dc, tr, dc)

Repeat the decorative sequence across the chain as shown in the reference.

The result should resemble the small purple fan-like crest shown on top of the peacock's head.

Fasten off.

Leave a yarn tail long enough to sew the crest to the head.

Attach the Crest

Position the purple crest on the very top of the head.

Arrange the points so they fan outward.

Sew the base securely to the head.

Make several small stitches through the base of the crest so it does not flop forward or backward.

Step 4: Crochet the Two Wings

Make **2 wings**.

Use **mint yarn** or another coordinating peacock color.

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Foundation

Ch 6.

Row 1

Starting in the **2nd chain from the hook**, work:

sc, hdc, dc, hdc, sc, sl st

Fasten off.

Leave a long yarn tail for sewing.

The resulting shape should be a small rounded/leaf-like wing.

Shape the Wings

Gently flatten each wing with your fingers.

You want the wing to have a curved, slightly pointed outline rather than looking like a straight strip.

Make sure both wings are approximately the same size.

Attach the Wings

Place one wing on each side of the body.

The wings should sit around the upper-middle portion of the body, just below the head.

Sew each wing securely to the body.

Use several stitches around the base of each wing rather than attaching it at only one point.

The reference shows the wings angled slightly outward.

Step 5: Make the 15 Feather Motifs

The feather motifs form the colorful tail.

Make **15 individual feather motifs**.

You can use one color for all of them, but the reference uses multiple colors, including shades of mint/green, blue, purple, pink/coral, yellow, and green.

A pearl bead is placed in the center of each completed feather.

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Feather Motif — Foundation

Ch 6.

Row 1

Starting in the **2nd chain from the hook**, work:

(dc, tr, dc, hdc, sc, sl st)

Fasten off.

Leave a yarn tail if you intend to sew the motif to the finished piece.

Row 2

Attach yarn as needed.

Ch 3, turn.

Work:

(sc, hdc, dc, hdc, sc)

around the previous row, working into the sides as shown by the reference.

Fasten off.

The completed motif should have a pointed/teardrop or feather-like outline.

Add the Pearl Center

Place one **12 mm pearl bead** in the center of each feather.

You can sew the pearl in place using matching yarn or strong sewing thread.

Make sure the bead is secure before attaching the feather to the dreamcatcher.

Make all 15

Repeat the feather pattern until you have:

15 finished feather motifs

Using different colors gives the tail the colorful peacock appearance shown in the example.

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Step 6: Prepare the Embroidery Hoop

Use a **10-inch (25 cm) embroidery hoop**.

The hoop forms the circular structure of the dreamcatcher.

The reference uses a white lace-like crocheted background inside the hoop.

Attach the Background Yarn

Use **white yarn** for the hoop background.

Attach the yarn to the hoop.

The chart provides the stitch arrangement for the lace section.

Work the chart pattern around the hoop, following the symbols from the outside edge inward/around the circumference as shown in the provided crochet diagram.

The important point is to maintain the spacing and repeating structure of the chart so that the crochet forms an even circular lace background.

Chart symbols to follow

When reading the chart:

- A **dot** indicates a slip stitch.
- An **oval** indicates a chain.
- An **X** indicates a single crochet.
- A short **T** indicates a half double crochet.
- The double-crochet symbol indicates a double crochet.
- The taller symbol indicates a treble crochet.
- Cluster/puff symbols are worked as indicated in the chart.
- Picot symbols create the small decorative points around the lace.

Continue the repeating lace pattern until the entire hoop has been covered.

Keep the Lace Even

As you work around the hoop, periodically check that:

- The stitches are not pulling the hoop out of shape.
- The lace is evenly distributed.
- There are no large gaps between repeated sections.
- The circular shape remains symmetrical.

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If your tension is significantly tighter or looser than the reference, the lace may not fit the hoop correctly.

Fasten off and secure the yarn neatly once the lace background is complete.

Step 7: Center the Peacock on the Hoop

Place the completed peacock body in the center of the crocheted hoop background.

The body should sit vertically, with the head near the upper-middle area of the hoop.

The wings should extend toward the left and right sides.

Before sewing, step back and check the composition.

The peacock should be:

- Centered horizontally.
- Upright.
- Positioned so the tail can spread naturally underneath.
- Clear of the outer edge of the hoop.

Sew the Peacock in Place

Use a yarn needle and coordinating yarn.

Sew the peacock securely to the crocheted background.

Attach the body at several points rather than relying on a single stitch.

Check the front frequently while sewing to ensure the peacock remains straight.

Step 8: Arrange the Feather Tail

Now arrange the **15 feather motifs** beneath the peacock.

The reference shows the feathers radiating outward and downward from the body.

Place the motifs in layers rather than attaching them randomly.

A useful arrangement is:

- A few feathers close to the body.
- Additional feathers spreading toward the left and right.
- Several feathers extending downward.
- The longest-looking central arrangement toward the bottom.

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- The outer feathers angled outward.

The exact positioning can be adjusted to match your hoop and personal preference, but keep the overall arrangement balanced.

Sew the Feather Motifs

Once you are happy with the arrangement, sew the feather motifs securely to the crocheted background and/or supporting sections.

Use the yarn tails where possible.

Make sure each feather is attached at a strong point near its upper end.

Do not sew only through a loose decorative loop if the motif will be carrying a hanging strand.

Step 9: Add the Hanging Strands

The finished reference has multiple strands hanging from the lower part of the dreamcatcher.

These strands connect the feather motifs to additional decorative feathers and tassels.

For each strand, follow the same general construction shown in the reference.

Basic Strand Construction

Attach yarn to the appropriate lower point.

Then add:

1. A feather motif.
2. A **12 mm pearl bead**.
3. Another feather motif if desired.
4. Finish the strand with a tassel.

The reference specifically recommends:

- 1. Attach a feather.**
- 2. Add a pearl bead (12 mm).**
- 3. Add another feather (optional).**
- 4. Finish with a tassel.**

You can also use optional gold jump rings when they make attachment easier.

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Position the Strands

Distribute the strands evenly across the lower portion of the hoop.

The reference shows hanging strands at different positions and lengths, creating a cascading effect.

Avoid making every strand exactly the same length.

The varied lengths give the finished dreamcatcher its decorative shape.

Step 10: Make the Yarn Tassels

The tassels are made from yarn.

You can use the same color as the feather above each tassel or coordinate the colors.

Basic Tassel Method

1. Wrap yarn repeatedly around a book or another flat object approximately **6–7 inches long**.
2. Continue wrapping until you have the desired thickness.
3. Tie the top securely.
4. Cut the yarn at the bottom.
5. Remove the wrapped yarn from the book.
6. Tie another section near the top to create the tassel head.
7. Trim the bottom ends evenly.
8. Attach the tassel to the hanging strand.

The reference specifically recommends wrapping yarn around a book and using approximately **60–70 turns**.

Shape the Tassel

After tying the tassel, comb the strands with your fingers.

Trim the ends so they are relatively even.

You can make the tassel fuller by adding more wraps or thinner by reducing the number of wraps.

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Step 11: Assemble the Hanging Strands

Connect each completed strand to the lower portion of the dreamcatcher.

A typical strand can be arranged like this:

Hoop → connecting chain → feather → pearl → optional feather → tassel

Secure every connection firmly.

The finished strands should hang freely rather than being sewn tightly against the hoop.

Check the Balance

Place the finished dreamcatcher on a flat surface.

Look at it from several feet away.

Check whether:

- The left and right sides look balanced.
- The peacock is centered.
- The tail spreads naturally.
- The tassels hang vertically.
- No strand is twisted.
- No pearl or feather is sitting at an awkward angle.

Make adjustments before trimming any remaining yarn tails.

Step 12: Final Finishing

Go through the entire project and inspect every attachment.

Secure:

- Head to body
- Crest to head
- Wings to body
- Feather motifs
- Pearls
- Hanging strands
- Tassels
- Lace background
- Any jump rings

Weave in loose yarn ends.

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If necessary, use a tiny amount of **optional hot glue** on hidden attachment points. Do not rely on glue alone for structural connections that carry weight.

Step 13: Blocking and Shaping

If the lace background or feather motifs look uneven, lightly shape them with your fingers.

For a more polished result, you can gently block the crocheted pieces before final assembly.

The goal is to create:

- A smooth circular hoop.
- Flat feather motifs.
- Symmetrical wings.
- A centered peacock.
- Evenly hanging tassels.

Avoid excessive heat, particularly when using acrylic yarn.

Step 14: Final Layout

Your completed peacock dreamcatcher should have the following overall structure:

Top:

Circular crocheted lace background

Center:

Mint crocheted peacock with:

- Rounded head
- Safety eyes
- Peach beak
- Purple crest
- Two wings
- Stuffed body

Lower center:

Colorful arrangement of **15 feather motifs**, each with a pearl center

Bottom:

Several hanging strands decorated with feathers, pearl beads, optional additional feathers, and yarn tassels

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Complete Project Checklist

Before calling the project finished, make sure you have:

- 1 crocheted peacock body
- 1 crocheted peacock head
- 2 wings
- 1 purple crest
- 15 feather motifs
- 15 pearl centers, where used
- 1 crocheted lace hoop background
- 1 embroidery hoop, approximately 10 in
- Safety eyes securely attached
- Beak securely sewn
- Peacock securely attached to hoop
- Feather tail arranged and secured
- Hanging strands attached
- Pearl beads attached to strands
- Tassels completed
- Loose ends woven in
- All connections checked for strength

Basic Stitch Guide

Chain (ch)

Yarn over and pull the yarn through the loop on your hook.

Chains are used to create foundation chains, spaces, and decorative sections.

Slip Stitch (sl st)

Insert the hook into the indicated stitch.

Yarn over and pull through the stitch and directly through the loop already on your hook.

Slip stitches are used for joining and creating very short stitches.

Single Crochet (sc)

Insert the hook into the stitch.

Yarn over and pull up a loop.

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You now have two loops on the hook.

Yarn over and pull through both loops.

Half Double Crochet (hdc)

Yarn over.

Insert the hook into the stitch.

Yarn over and pull up a loop.

Yarn over and pull through all three loops on the hook.

Double Crochet (dc)

Yarn over.

Insert the hook into the stitch.

Yarn over and pull up a loop.

Yarn over and pull through two loops.

Yarn over and pull through the remaining two loops.

Treble Crochet (tr)

Yarn over twice.

Insert the hook into the stitch.

Yarn over and pull up a loop.

Yarn over and pull through two loops.

Yarn over and pull through two loops again.

Yarn over and pull through the final two loops.

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How to Read the Crochet Chart

The large circular chart represents the lace portion of the dreamcatcher.

Start by identifying the center or attachment point shown in the chart, then follow each symbol around the repeating sections.

When the same sequence appears repeatedly around the circle, work that sequence around the entire section rather than treating each individual symbol as a completely separate instruction.

Pay particular attention to:

- Chain spaces.
- Slip-stitch joins.
- Groups of single crochet stitches.
- Taller stitches such as dc and tr.
- Decorative picots.
- Cluster/puff stitches.
- The repeated lace motifs around the hoop.

The chart is especially useful for the hoop background because it shows the exact visual relationship between the chains, stitches, and repeating lace sections.

Tips for Getting the Best Result ✨

Use stitch markers

Especially when making the body and head. A marker makes it much easier to keep track of continuous rounds.

Count your stitches

The body should progress:

6 → 12 → 18 → 24 → 30

and then remain at **30 stitches through Rounds 6–12** before decreasing.

The head should progress:

6 → 12 → 18 → 24

and remain at **24 stitches through Rounds 5–7**.

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Stuff gradually

Adding stuffing little by little produces a much smoother shape than putting a large amount in at once.

Check the eyes before securing them

Safety eyes are difficult to reposition after the backs have been locked in place.

Keep sewing tails long

When making the wings and feather motifs, leave enough yarn to sew them onto the project.

Use contrasting colors

The feather motifs look particularly attractive when each group uses a different pastel color.

Keep the peacock centered

Before permanently sewing the body to the hoop, check its position from the front and from several feet away.

Don't rush the final assembly

The crochet components are relatively small, but the final arrangement determines how professional the finished dreamcatcher looks.

Take time to arrange the feathers and hanging strands before sewing everything permanently.

Finished Peacock Dreamcatcher

When complete, you will have a colorful crochet peacock mounted inside a lace-covered embroidery hoop, surrounded by a decorative feather tail and finished with pearl accents and cascading yarn tassels.

The combination of the **mint peacock**, **pastel feather motifs**, **white lace**, **pearl centers**, and **colorful tassels** creates the soft handmade appearance shown in the reference.

The pattern is beginner-friendly overall, but the **lace hoop section and final assembly require careful attention to the chart and stitch placement**. For the most faithful reproduction, use the written instructions above for the individual crocheted components and the supplied chart as the visual authority for the circular lace background.
