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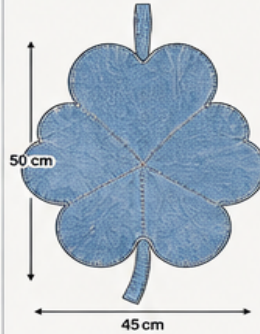
♥ DENIM FOUR-LEAF CLOVER ORGANIZER ♥

SEWING & QUILTING TUTORIAL

This cute four-leaf clover organizer is perfect for storing craft supplies, sewing tools, or everyday essentials.

FINISHED SIZE

45 cm (W) x 50 cm (H)
(Stem: 15 cm)



MATERIALS

- Denim fabric (medium weight) or cotton canvas (outer fabric)
- Quilting cotton (lining fabric)
- Fusible interfacing (medium weight)
- Thread (matching color)
- Sewing machine
- Hand sewing needle
- Fabric chalk or marking pen
- Clips or pins
- Scissors / Rotary cutter
- Ruler
- Iron and ironing board

RECOMMENDED FABRIC

Denim, canvas, or any medium to heavy weight cotton fabric that holds shape well.

SEAM ALLOWANCE

1 cm included in the pattern.
Cut 2 for main body
Cut 1 for each pocket.

SEWING LEGEND

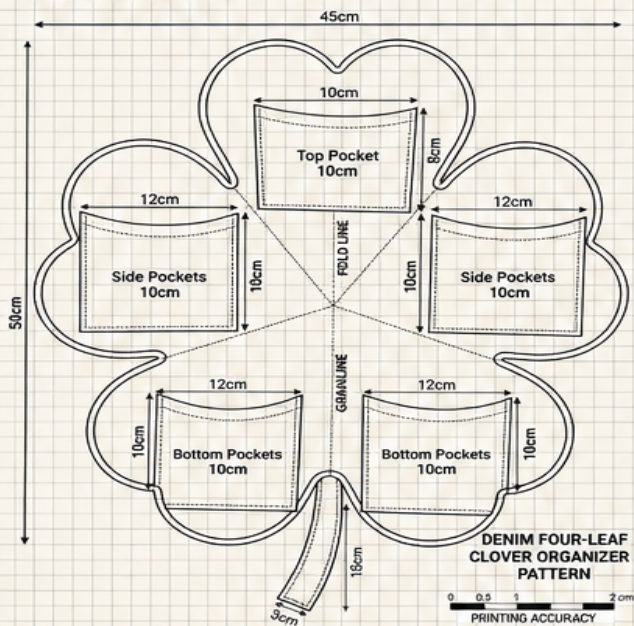
- Straight stitch
- ===== Topstitch
- Fold line
- Grainline
- ✓ Clip / Notch
- Start / End

QUILTING TIPS

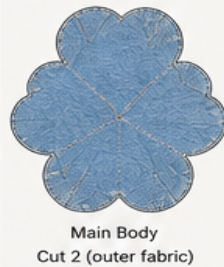
- Use quilting clips instead of pins to avoid marks on denim.
- Topstitching gives a beautiful finished look and extra strength.
- Iron well at every step for best results.

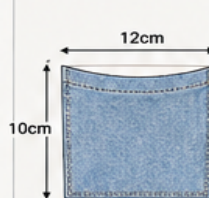
CUTTING LIST



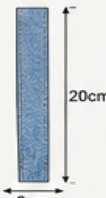
Main Body
Cut 2 (outer fabric)



Main Body
Cut 2 (lining fabric)



Pockets
Cut 4 (outer fabric)
Cut 4 (lining fabric)



Hanging Loop
Cut 1
5cm (W) x 20cm (L)
(fold in half)

INTERFACING

Fuse interfacing to the wrong side of the outer main body piece (both pieces).



STEP-BY-STEP INSTRUCTIONS

1. PREPARE MAIN BODY

- Cut all pieces as listed above.
- Fuse interfacing to wrong side of outer main body pieces.

2. PREPARE POCKETS

- Pair each pocket outer fabric with lining fabric (right sides together).
- Sew along the top curved edge (12 cm).
- Turn right side out and press.

3. TOPSTITCH POCKETS

- Fold the top edge 1 cm to the wrong side.
- Topstitch along the top edge.
- Make 4 pockets.

4. MARK CENTER LINES

- On one main body piece (outer fabric), mark the vertical grainline and the fold line.
- Mark the center point where all lines meet.

5. PLACE TOP POCKET

- Center the top pocket on the top leaf.
- Top of pocket 8 cm from the top curve.
- Side edges 10 cm wide.
- Pin or clip in place.

6. PLACE SIDE POCKETS

- Center side pockets on the left and right leaves.
- Top edges aligned with the center line intersection.
- Keep 10 cm height and 12 cm wide.
- Pin or clip in place.

7. TOPSTITCH TO POCKETS

- Center bottom pockets on the lower leaves.
- Top edges aligned with the center point.
- Keep 10 cm height and 12 cm wide.
- Pin or clip in place.

8. TOPSTITCH ALL POCKETS

- Topstitch around the sides and bottom of each pocket to secure.
- Reinforce at the top corners.

9. SEW MAIN BODY



10. TRIM & CLIP CURVES

- Place outer pieces right sides together.
- Pin or clip all around the edge, including the stem and loop area (leave loop out for now).
- Sew around the entire edge with 1 cm seam allowance.

10. TRIM & CLIP CURVES

- Trim seam allowance.
- Clip along all curves and the inner "V" between the leaves.
- Turn right side out.

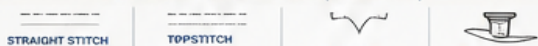
11. ADD HANGING LOOP

- Fold the loop strip in half lengthwise (right sides together).
- Sew long edge, turn right side out, press.
- Insert loop between the top layers at the top center.
- Topstitch to secure.

12. FINAL TOPSTITCH

- Topstitch around the entire outer edge for a clean finish and extra durability.
- Your organizer is ready!

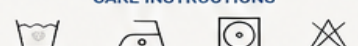
BASIC SEWING METHODS (US TERMS)

CARE INSTRUCTIONS



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Complete Sewing Tutorial

This tutorial explains how to sew the **Denim Four-Leaf Clover Organizer** from start to finish, following the measurements, construction order, sewing methods, and finishing details shown in the pattern graphic.

The finished organizer is approximately **45 cm (17 3/4 in) wide × 50 cm (19 3/4 in) high**, not including the hanging loop. The hanging loop adds approximately **15 cm (5 7/8 in)** of visible length.

It features:

- One four-leaf-clover-shaped main organizer body
- One top pocket
- Two side pockets
- Two bottom pockets
- A center fold/grainline reference
- A hanging loop at the top
- Quilted or interfaced denim construction
- Topstitching for strength and a finished denim look

The pattern is designed around **centimeters**, so a metric ruler is recommended for the most accurate results. The inch conversions below are approximate and should not replace the original centimeter measurements.

Materials and Supplies

Fabric

You will need:

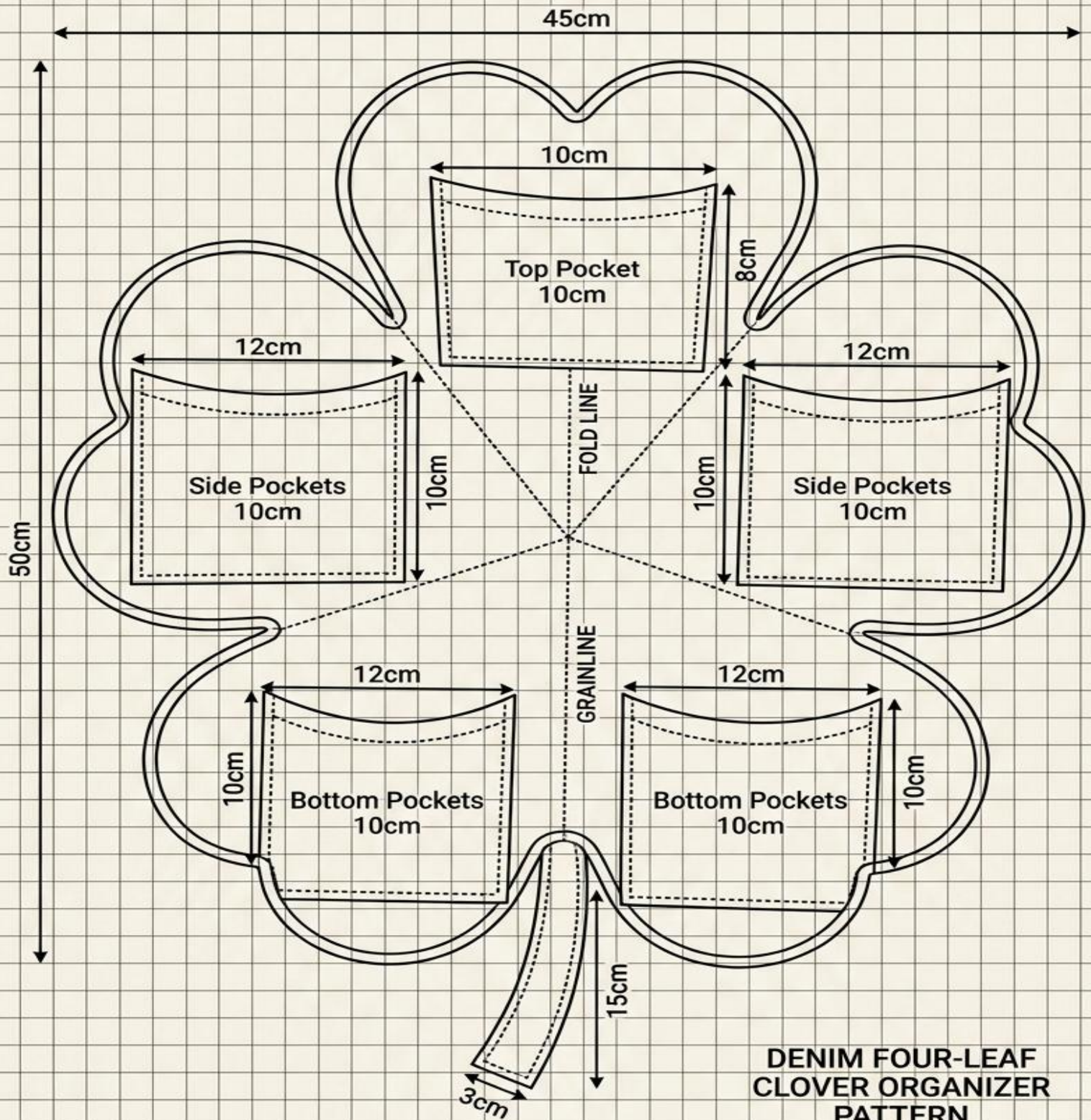
- **Medium-weight denim, cotton canvas, or another sturdy woven fabric** for the outer pieces
- **Quilting cotton or another lightweight woven fabric** for the lining
- **Medium-weight fusible interfacing**
- Matching or coordinating **heavy-duty sewing thread**

The pattern recommends denim, canvas, or medium/heavy cotton for the outer fabric because the organizer needs enough structure to hold its four-leaf shape and support the pockets.

For a traditional denim organizer, use denim for the exterior and quilting cotton for the lining.

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Sewing Equipment

Gather:

- Sewing machine
- Hand-sewing needle
- Fabric scissors or rotary cutter
- Cutting mat if using a rotary cutter
- Ruler
- Fabric chalk or washable fabric marker
- Pins or quilting clips
- Iron
- Ironing board
- Measuring tape
- Seam ripper
- Optional: point turner or blunt turning tool

Quilting clips are particularly useful when working with several layers of denim.

Understanding the Pattern Measurements

The pattern already includes a **1 cm seam allowance**.

That means you should **not add another 1 cm around the pattern pieces when cutting**.

The main dimensions shown on the pattern are:

- Main organizer: **45 cm wide × 50 cm high**
- Top pocket: **10 cm wide × 8 cm high**
- Side pockets: **12 cm wide × 10 cm high each**
- Bottom pockets: **12 cm wide × 10 cm high each**
- Hanging loop: **5 cm wide × 20 cm long before folding**
- Finished visible hanging loop: approximately **15 cm**
- Loop width after folding: approximately **2.5 cm**
- Seam allowance: **1 cm**

Approximate U.S. conversions:

- 1 cm ≈ 3/8 in
- 5 cm ≈ 2 in
- 8 cm ≈ 3 1/8 in
- 10 cm ≈ 4 in
- 12 cm ≈ 4 3/4 in
- 15 cm ≈ 5 7/8 in
- 20 cm ≈ 7 7/8 in
- 45 cm ≈ 17 3/4 in
- 50 cm ≈ 19 3/4 in

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For accuracy, especially when transferring the curved pattern, use the centimeter measurements from the original pattern.

Cutting List

Cut the following pieces.

Main Body

Cut:

- **2 outer-fabric main body pieces**
- **2 lining main body pieces**

The main body is the large four-leaf-clover shape.

The two outer pieces will form the exterior, while the two lining pieces will form the inside.

Pockets

Cut:

- **4 outer-fabric pocket pieces**
- **4 lining pocket pieces**

You need four pockets total:

1. One top pocket
2. One left side pocket
3. One right side pocket
4. Two bottom pockets

The pattern graphic labels the side and bottom pockets as 12 cm wide × 10 cm high and the top pocket as 10 cm wide × 8 cm high.

Follow the individual pocket outlines on the pattern when cutting because the pocket tops have a curved shape.

Hanging Loop

Cut:

- **1 strip measuring 5 cm × 20 cm**

The strip is folded in half lengthwise during construction.

Step 1: Prepare and Cut the Main Body

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Place the main-body pattern on your outer fabric.

Make sure the fabric is smooth and stable before cutting.

Transfer the four-leaf-clover outline carefully. The pattern includes several inward curves and rounded leaf sections, so accurate cutting is important.

Cut **two identical outer main-body pieces**.

Then use the same main-body shape to cut **two lining pieces**.

Do not add additional seam allowance. The pattern already includes the **1 cm seam allowance**.

Mark the Grainline

The pattern includes a vertical **GRAINLINE** through the center of the organizer.

Place the grainline parallel to the fabric selvage when cutting whenever possible.

This keeps the organizer balanced and helps prevent the finished shape from twisting.

Mark the Center

Transfer the center point and center vertical line to the fabric using chalk or a washable fabric marker.

Also mark the center of the upper leaf.

These marks will help you position the pockets accurately.

Step 2: Apply the Fusible Interfacing

Take the two outer main-body pieces.

Place the fusible interfacing against the **wrong side of each outer main-body piece**, following the manufacturer's instructions for your particular interfacing.

Use the iron to fuse the interfacing securely.

Allow the fabric to cool completely before moving it.

The interfacing gives the denim organizer additional body and helps the finished piece hold its shape.

Do not apply interfacing to the lining unless your particular interfacing or fabric combination requires it.

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Step 3: Prepare the Pocket Pieces

Cut all eight pocket pieces:

- 4 outer pocket pieces
- 4 lining pocket pieces

Pair each outer pocket with its corresponding lining.

You will have:

- 1 top pocket pair
- 2 side pocket pairs
- 2 bottom pocket pairs

Place each pocket's outer fabric and lining **right sides together**.

Clip or pin around the edges.

Step 4: Sew the Pocket Curved Tops

Starting with the top edge of each pocket, sew along the curved top edge using a **1 cm seam allowance**.

The pattern's pocket tops are slightly curved rather than straight.

Sew slowly around the curve so the seam follows the pattern accurately.

Backstitch at the beginning and end of the seam.

Clip the Curve

After sewing, carefully clip or notch the seam allowance around the curved portion.

Make small clips into the seam allowance without cutting through the stitching.

This allows the curve to spread when the pocket is turned right side out.

For a tighter curve, use more closely spaced clips.

Turn and Press

Turn each pocket right side out.

Gently push the curved top into shape.

Press the pocket flat with the iron.

Be careful not to distort the curve.

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Step 5: Topstitch the Pocket Tops

Topstitch across the curved upper edge of each pocket.

The pattern recommends topstitching as a decorative and structural feature.

Use a denim-appropriate thread if desired.

A longer stitch length, such as approximately **3–3.5 mm**, works well for decorative denim topstitching, although you should test the stitch on scraps first.

Keep the stitching an even distance from the edge.

Repeat for all five pockets.

Step 6: Mark the Center Lines on the Main Body

Place one prepared outer main-body piece flat with the right side facing upward.

Using the pattern as your guide, mark the vertical center line.

The pattern identifies this as the **FOLD LINE** in the upper center and **GRAINLINE** through the main body.

Mark the center point where the lines meet.

The pattern also shows diagonal construction/placement lines radiating from the center area.

These marks help establish the position of the pockets and keep the organizer symmetrical.

Use a removable fabric marker or chalk.

Step 7: Position the Top Pocket

Place the prepared top pocket on the upper leaf.

The pocket should be centered horizontally on the top leaf.

According to the pattern:

- Pocket width: **10 cm**
- Pocket height: **8 cm**

The pattern indicates that the top of the pocket should be positioned approximately **8 cm down from the top curved area**.

Measure carefully from the center and top curve rather than relying only on visual placement.

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Clip or pin the pocket in position.

Check that the pocket is centered before sewing.

Step 8: Sew the Top Pocket

Sew the top pocket directly onto the main-body piece.

Sew along:

- Left side
- Bottom
- Right side

Do **not** sew across the curved top opening.

The curved top remains open so the pocket can hold supplies.

Backstitch or reinforce the stitching at both upper corners.

These corners receive additional stress whenever items are placed into or removed from the pocket.

Step 9: Position the Side Pockets

Take the two side pockets.

Place one pocket on the left leaf and one on the right leaf.

Each side pocket measures approximately:

- **12 cm wide**
- **10 cm high**

Center each pocket on its corresponding leaf.

The pattern shows the side pockets positioned symmetrically on the left and right sides of the organizer.

Check that:

- Both pockets are at the same height.
- Both pockets are centered on their leaves.
- The curved pocket openings face upward.
- The pockets do not cross the central fold/grainline area.

Clip or pin each pocket in place.

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Step 10: Sew the Side Pockets

Sew around the sides and bottom of each side pocket.

Leave the curved top open.

At each upper corner, reinforce the stitching.

A small backstitch or additional stitching triangle/bar tack can help strengthen these stress points.

Repeat on the opposite side.

Before continuing, compare the left and right pockets visually to make sure they are symmetrical.

Step 11: Position the Bottom Pockets

Place the two bottom pockets on the lower leaves.

Each pocket is approximately:

- **12 cm wide**
- **10 cm high**

Center one pocket on the lower-left leaf and the other on the lower-right leaf.

Keep the pockets aligned with each other.

The pattern shows the pockets positioned symmetrically on either side of the center line.

Make sure the pocket openings face upward.

Clip or pin them into place.

Step 12: Sew the Bottom Pockets

Sew around the sides and bottom of both bottom pockets.

Leave the curved upper edges open.

Reinforce both upper corners.

Because these pockets may be used for heavier craft supplies, stronger stitching is recommended.

At this stage, the outer main-body piece should have five attached pockets:

- 1 top

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- 2 side
- 2 bottom

Check all five pockets before moving on.

Step 13: Topstitch Around All Pocket Edges

Topstitch around the sewn sides and bottoms of all five pockets.

Keep the stitching neat and consistent.

Topstitching has two purposes:

1. It strengthens the pocket attachment.
2. It creates the characteristic finished denim look.

At the upper corners, reinforce the stitching because these areas experience the greatest pulling force.

Use matching thread for a subtle finish or contrasting denim/gold thread for a more traditional jeans-style appearance.

Step 14: Prepare the Two Main Body Layers

Place the completed outer main-body piece with the attached pockets together with the second outer main-body piece.

The pattern calls for two outer main-body pieces.

Place the pieces **right sides together**.

Align the entire outer perimeter carefully.

Match:

- The top leaf
- Left leaf
- Right leaf
- Lower leaves
- Bottom center area
- Hanging-loop opening/center area

Use clips or pins around the perimeter.

Because the shape has many curves, clips are especially useful.

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Step 15: Sew Around the Main Body

Sew around the entire outer perimeter using the included **1 cm seam allowance**.

Sew slowly around every rounded leaf and inward curve.

Keep the seam line smooth and consistent.

Do not rush through the tight inward curves at the center.

Leave an appropriate opening for turning if your construction method requires one, preferably in a less noticeable straight or gently curved area.

Backstitch at the beginning and end of the stitching.

Step 16: Trim and Clip the Curves

Before turning the organizer right side out, carefully trim and clip the seam allowance around the curved perimeter.

For outward curves

Make small notches or clips into the seam allowance.

For inward curves

Clip more frequently so the seam allowance can spread when turned.

Be extremely careful not to cut through the stitching.

You can also trim bulky seam allowance in areas with multiple layers.

The pattern specifically calls for trimming the seam allowance and clipping along the curves.

Step 17: Turn the Main Body Right Side Out

Carefully turn the organizer right side out through the opening.

Work slowly around the curves.

Use a blunt point-turning tool if necessary to gently push the rounded leaf sections into their final shape.

Do not use a sharp object that could puncture the fabric.

Press the entire organizer carefully.

Pay particular attention to the curved perimeter.

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The outer edge should be smooth and clearly defined.

Step 18: Prepare the Lining

The lining consists of the second main-body layer and corresponding pocket pieces.

The lining pocket construction follows the same basic method as the outer pockets.

For each lining pocket:

1. Place lining pocket and its corresponding lining piece right sides together.
2. Sew the curved upper edge.
3. Clip/notch the curve.
4. Turn right side out.
5. Press.
6. Topstitch the curved opening if desired/required by the construction shown.
7. Position the pocket on the lining main body.
8. Sew the sides and bottom.

The lining should mirror the outer organizer.

Make sure the pockets correspond to the same five locations.

Step 19: Join the Outer Body and Lining

Place the finished outer organizer and lining together according to the construction method.

The right sides should be positioned correctly so that, after turning, the organizer's exterior and lining will face the proper directions.

Align the entire outer edge.

Clip around the perimeter.

Sew the outer edge using the included **1 cm seam allowance**.

Take your time around the many curves.

Step 20: Turn the Organizer

Turn the organizer right side out through the opening.

Work each leaf into shape.

Gently push out:

- The rounded outer curves
- The inward curves between leaves

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- The center area
- The bottom center opening/neck area

Press the organizer thoroughly.

A good pressing job makes a major difference in the finished appearance.

Step 21: Make the Hanging Loop

Take the **5 cm × 20 cm** hanging-loop strip.

Fold the strip in half lengthwise, with the wrong sides together if using the simple folded construction shown in the graphic.

Press the fold firmly.

The finished folded strip is approximately **2.5 cm wide**.

Sew along the long edges to secure the folded strip.

The pattern indicates a finished visible loop of approximately **15 cm**, with the original strip measuring 20 cm.

Step 22: Attach the Hanging Loop

Position the hanging loop at the top center of the organizer.

The loop should sit behind or between the appropriate layers at the top center so that the attachment is clean and secure.

Insert the loop into the top-center area according to the pattern's construction.

Make sure the loop is centered on the vertical grainline/fold line.

Clip it securely in place.

Sew across the attachment area several times.

Because the organizer will hang from this loop, reinforce the stitching thoroughly.

Step 23: Final Edge Topstitching

The final step is to topstitch around the entire outer perimeter.

Use a consistent distance from the edge.

This final topstitching:

- Secures the layers

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- Helps flatten the seam allowance
- Strengthens the organizer
- Defines the four-leaf shape
- Gives the project a professional denim finish

Slow down around the curves.

If your sewing machine struggles with several layers of denim, use a denim needle and sew slowly rather than forcing the fabric through the machine.

Step 24: Reinforce the High-Stress Areas

Inspect the organizer carefully.

Reinforce:

- Pocket upper corners
- Pocket side seams
- Hanging-loop attachment
- Center junction if necessary
- Any area where multiple layers meet

A short bar tack or several rows of straight stitching can provide additional strength.

Step 25: Final Press

Give the completed organizer one final pressing.

Press each pocket flat.

Press the outer curves.

Press the hanging loop.

Do not flatten the organizer so aggressively that you distort the four-leaf shape.

The goal is a crisp, structured appearance while maintaining the rounded silhouette.

Step 26: Inspect the Finished Organizer

Before using the organizer, check:

- All five pockets are securely attached.
- All pocket openings are facing upward.
- The pocket tops are evenly curved.
- The left and right sides are reasonably symmetrical.
- The outer perimeter is completely sewn.
- There are no untrimmed bulky seams.

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- The hanging loop is centered.
- The hanging loop is strongly reinforced.
- The final topstitching is continuous and neat.
- There are no loose threads.

Trim loose threads with sharp scissors.

Your organizer is now ready to hang.

Quilting and Finishing Tips

Use Quilting Clips Instead of Too Many Pins

Denim and multiple layers can become difficult to pin.

Quilting clips are useful for holding the curved perimeter and thick seam intersections without distorting the fabric.

Test Your Topstitching

Before sewing directly onto the organizer, test your thread, needle, stitch length, and tension on scraps of the same fabric.

This is especially important when using thick denim thread.

Use a Denim Needle

For medium-weight or heavy denim, use an appropriately sized denim or jeans needle.

A fresh needle helps prevent skipped stitches and unnecessary strain on the sewing machine.

Sew Slowly Over Thick Areas

When crossing pocket corners or multiple layers of denim, reduce your sewing speed.

If necessary, use a hump-jumper or folded scrap of fabric behind the presser foot to help maintain an even presser-foot angle.

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Press Throughout the Project

Do not wait until the very end to press.

Press:

- Pocket curves
- Pocket openings
- Folded loop
- Main seams
- Finished outer edge

Good pressing makes curved sewing considerably easier.

Basic Sewing Methods Used in This Pattern

Straight Stitch

Use the standard straight stitch for:

- Constructing seams
- Attaching pockets
- Sewing the hanging loop
- Joining the organizer layers

Backstitch at the beginning and end of important seams.

Topstitch

Topstitching is visible decorative stitching sewn close to an edge.

This pattern uses topstitching around the pocket openings and pocket edges, as well as around the final outer perimeter.

For denim, a contrasting thread can create a classic jeans-inspired appearance.

Clip and Notch

Clipping and notching the seam allowance is essential for curved seams.

For an outward curve, small notches help prevent the seam allowance from bunching.

For an inward curve, small clips allow the seam allowance to spread.

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Never cut through the actual seam.

Pressing

Press seams with an iron rather than simply ironing back and forth.

For a crisp result:

1. Sew the seam.
2. Press it.
3. Turn or construct the next layer.
4. Press again.

Recommended Sewing Order at a Glance

For an efficient workflow, follow this sequence:

1. Prepare fabric.
2. Cut two outer main bodies.
3. Cut two lining main bodies.
4. Cut four outer pocket pieces.
5. Cut four lining pocket pieces.
6. Cut one 5 × 20 cm hanging-loop strip.
7. Apply fusible interfacing to the wrong side of both outer main-body pieces.
8. Prepare all pockets.
9. Sew and press pocket curved tops.
10. Topstitch pocket openings.
11. Mark the main-body center and grainline.
12. Position the top pocket.
13. Sew the top pocket.
14. Position and sew the two side pockets.
15. Position and sew the two bottom pockets.
16. Topstitch all pocket sides and bottoms.
17. Prepare the main outer layers.
18. Sew around the main body.
19. Clip and trim the curves.
20. Turn and press.
21. Prepare and attach the lining.
22. Join outer and lining layers.
23. Turn the organizer.
24. Make the hanging loop.
25. Insert and reinforce the loop at the top center.
26. Topstitch the complete outer perimeter.
27. Reinforce stress points.
28. Press and inspect the finished organizer.

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Care Instructions

The pattern recommends gentle care for the finished organizer.

For washing:

- Machine wash on a **cold, gentle cycle**
- Avoid harsh washing conditions
- Do not use bleach
- Tumble dry on **low** if necessary

For ironing:

- Use **medium heat**
- Press carefully, especially around the pockets and interfaced areas

Because denim, interfacing, lining, and thread can react differently to heat and moisture, test your care method on a small scrap whenever possible.

Final Result

When completed, the project should have a structured **four-leaf-clover silhouette** **approximately 45 × 50 cm**, with five functional pockets distributed around the leaves:

-  **1 top pocket:** 10 × 8 cm
-  **2 side pockets:** 12 × 10 cm each
-  **2 bottom pockets:** 12 × 10 cm each

The center grainline keeps the design balanced, while the reinforced hanging loop allows the organizer to be displayed vertically on a wall, door, craft-room surface, or other suitable location.

The combination of denim, quilting cotton lining, interfacing, reinforced pocket corners, curved pocket openings, and perimeter topstitching creates a sturdy organizer suitable for **sewing notions, craft supplies, small tools, stationery, accessories, or everyday essentials**.
